Ladies, the LA Times published an article from the Associated Press on 4/3/23 that truly startled me. The article refers to sailors who are having a hard time adjusting to the stresses that weigh on young adults nationwide. "Growing mental health distress in the ranks carries such grave implications that the U.S. chief of naval operations, Adm. Michael Gilday, answered "suicides" when asked this year what in the security environment kept him up at night?". We have all heard about the growing number of suicides among veterans. The Legion has two programs to help with this issue. "Be the One" and "Buddy Check Week", please familiarize yourselves with these programs, you may end up being the one who saves a life.

I am looking forward to year end reports this year. There is a new question on them. Number 7 ask, "Did you subscribe to votervoice.net/AmericanLegion/home?" This question refers to the new Grassroots efforts that make it easier for the American Legion Family to respond quickly to bills that are current and/or about to be discussed on the Congress or the Senate floor. If you have not signed up yet, then please get on board. You will see how easy it is to contact your reps. It just takes a few clicks, no excuses! These alerts are sent by Katie Isaacson (Am. Leg. Coordinator) along with a PDF file for a weekly status if you wish to view. Katie sends the PDF files regularly alerts or not.

PACT ACT: Please know that: 20 is the minimum number of conditions newly presumed as service-connected under the PACT ACT. Ladies, that includes **Agent Orange** for Viet Nam Vets. Also, 450,000 is the estimated backlog of VA disability claims by October 2023! Already 300,000 claims have been filed since Pres. Biden signed the law last August. It is estimated that 3.5 million veterans were affected by toxic contamination! The VA has increased staffing to process the influx of new claims, adding nearly 1900 new authorized PACT Act positions to handle millions of new disability claims.

Sending care packages to a deployed service member is not only a supreme act of kindness (especially when you do not know them personally) but is a tangible way to let them know that someone is thinking of them "back home". While they are restrictions on what you can send (see many lists available online), it's more about the idea and thought. Just imagine a service member opening up a box and finding their favorite chips. You know that's going to make that person feel better and maybe help a little with being away from home.

In November of 2020, the USO officially delivered it's three millionth care package and that does not include packages sent by individuals and other organizations like the American Legion Auxiliary. Remember when sending care packages, the size of the box is very important, the bigger the box the more it costs to ship it. A company called "Shipthrifty" works with individuals to send care packages. Their website indicates that they provide free labels when sending twenty-five packages or more and have discovered different savings opportunities that can save most groups a huge amount of money. You can find more information at http://shipthrifty.com. Regardless of how you ship the boxes, get them sent by Thanksgiving or the end of November to allow for shipping time.

Members and dues:

Should you have a rule in your constitution and bylaws that requires lapsed members to pay "back dues" before reinstating into membership? The answer is no. You can't discipline a member for not paying dues. If they no longer want to pay dues and belong to the organization, that is the decision of the member. If a member wants to keep "continuous years of membership" the member may opt to pay all the back dues owed, but it's not a requirement for reinstatement.

A member must be current with dues before transferring to another unit.

From the Editor's

Corner

The Earth Day 2023 Theme is 'Invest in Our Planet'

Earth Day is an annual event celebrated on April 22nd worldwide. Every year, the **Earth Day theme** is announced. Earth Day is a day of action and a reminder for everyone to reflect on the impact of human activity on the planet. It is also a day to celebrate our beautiful planet and take action to preserve it.

This year's Earth Day theme is designed to persuade businesses, governments, and citizens around the world of the need to invest in our planet to improve our environment and give our descendants a better and safer future.

Earth Day was first celebrated in 1970 in the United States, inspired by the devastating oil spill in Santa Barbara, California, in 1969. That year, at a UNESCO conference in San Francisco, peace activist John McConnell proposed a day to honor the Earth and the concept of peace, to first be observed on March 21, 1970 - the first day of spring in the northern hemisphere. This day of nature's equipoise was later sanctioned in a proclamation written by McConnell and signed by Secretary-General U Thant at the United Nations.

A month later, United States Senator Gaylord Nelson proposed the idea to hold a nationwide environmental teach-in on April 22, 1970. He hired a young activist, Denis Hayes, to be the National Coordinator. Nelson and Hayed renamed the event 'Earth Day'. Denis and his staff grew the event beyond the original idea for a teach-in to include the entire United States. More than 20 million people poured out on the streets, and the first Earth Day remains the largest single-day protest in human history. It also helped spur the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency and the passage of important environmental legislation.

As 1990 approached, a group of environmental leaders approached Denis Hayes to once again organize another major campaign for the planet. This time, Earth Day went global, mobilizing 200 million people in 141 countries and lifting environmental issues onto the world stage. Earth Day 1990 gave a huge boost to recycling efforts worldwide and helped pave the way for the 1992 United Nations Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro. It also prompted President Bill Clinton to award Senator Nelson the Presidential Medal of Freedom — the highest honor given to civilians in the United States — for his role as Earth Day founder.

On Earth Day 2016, the landmark Paris Agreement was signed by the United States, the United Kingdom, China, and 120 other countries. This signing satisfied a key requirement for the entry into force of the historic draft climate protection treaty adopted by the consensus of the 195 nations present at the 2015 United Nations Climate Change Conference in Paris.
