
Vision Statement

Why do the same members always get to go to the National Convention? What can I do to assure that there is room for me in 2022?

National Delegates and Alternates are initially elected at their District preconvention caucus. Please refer to your District Standing Rules for further information regarding specific requirements.

The elected representatives are placed into nomination and elected National Delegates/Alternates at the Department Convention. The number of National Delegates/Alternates elected are based on the strength of our membership.

At this time, we do not have enough members for 30 Delegate/Alternate representatives. Our Department is limited to the number Delegates/Alternates allowed to be elected.

All members are encouraged and allowed to attend the National Convention as guests, providing they purchase a guest badge from Department for identification.

Where are They Now?

From Girls State to Pulitzer Prize Nominated Journalist

It's been many years since I was chosen to represent my community at Girls State yet it remains a high school highlight. The lessons I learned there helped me later when I became a journalist.

At Girls State, there were jobs to fill (elected or appointed) on three levels — city government, county government and the state. Losing my race to be a county sheriff was disappointing early in the week.

But a door opened by a friend from my dorm floor was elected state auditor and appointed me to be a top deputy in her office. We spent hours tabulating figures and making sure cities and counties in the state had properly spent their tax dollars.

Later, as a reporter, I understood how to find these state audits — which are generally public record but not always announced — and turn them into interesting news stories. For instance, citizens do not like it when they learn some public official used their tax dollars to buy floral arrangements and meals with expensive wine.

As a reporter at a Pulitzer Prize-winning paper (and a nominee for a Pulitzer myself), I covered lots of different areas. But government reporting was always one of my favorites.

I will always be grateful to the American Legion Auxiliary for sparking my interest and providing this incredible government week for young women. "Are You from Girls State?"

Introducing the New United Through Reading App

For 30 years, United Through Reading has provided the opportunity for service members to be video recorded reading a storybook aloud to a child they love.

While we encourage military members to video record stories at more than 200 physical UTR Story

Stations around the world, the service member can now download the United Through Reading App, which is both FREE and SECURE, on the Google Play and Apple Stores.

Upload and send your story time video by clicking the checkmark and entering an adult's email. Children can watch your story on a web browser on a computer or mobile device, making story time available anytime.

A free book is sent to the child with every recording.

Tech Corner Answers Your Questions



The surfing video running in the background is cool but makes me a little seasick when I'm trying to read the text on the page. It's distracting. Can it be turned off?

Yes, you can pause the background video by placing your mouse at the bottom left of the page above to reveal the "playback" controls. You cannot see it until you "mouse over" it. When you do, you will see the icons for pause (II), speaker, time points, enlarge screen, and the red progress bar (see above). Press the pause (II) button to stop the video and waves. Then you can move about the page without distractions.



The ALA Academy on National's website isn't working properly. I cannot open it no matter how many ways I type in or paste the URL into my browser.

Visit www.alaforveterans.org and either go to Member Sign In (top right) or create your profile. Once you sign in, go to Meetings/Trainings, then Online Training, and choose ALA Academy. The shortcut URL is www.alaforveterans.org/ALA-Academy, but you still have to sign-in. Then Launch Academy and you will have options to Get Started, Go to Your Learning Center with your list of courses, or pick up where you left off on a course like Using Poppy Funds.



How can I share large files like documents and pictures easily without having to use a "cloud" app?

AirDrop, Quick Share, and Nearby Share are all proprietary sharing apps for Apple, Samsung, and Android devices respectively. They all function similarly and require that you find the icon for the service on your mobile phone or tablet, turn it on, and then choose with whom you want to share a file. It also requires that the other person's device also be turned on to receive the file. It may also let you use a link to a cloud to share.

Swipe down on your mobile phone or tablet and go to

Settings (iPhones), Quick

Share (Samsung) or Nearby Share (Android) and make sure it is turned on. If you don't see it, swipe right or left to reveal additional pages. To share with devices nearby, turn

on your Bluetooth , device location , and Wi-Fi

The other person will need to turn on these settings in their device as well. Now you are both visible to each other's device.

To Share your File with Someone:

- 1. Open the content, like a photo or webpage.
- 2. Tap Share or Nearby Share (you may need to Turn On).
- 3. Hold your phone and your friend's device close to each other, about 6-12 inches.
- 4. Under "Looking for nearby devices," tap your friend's device.
- 5. When the "Sent" message shows, tap "Done."

To Get Content from Someone:

- 1. If you haven't already, make your device visible, tap the notification to do so.
- 2. If you haven't already, turn on Nearby Share, Bluetooth or location
- 3. If you didn't get the notification or your friend can't find your device then
 - a. Assuming you have done the above, check Airplane mode, turn on, and then off.
 - b. Turn your phone off, then back on.
 - c. Start again.

What's a Resolution?

Resolution: A word that not many of us really understand. It sounds complicated, but if we do research and read about it, we are going to learn and understand the meaning of it.

Resolution: The official expression of the opinion or will of a legislative body. The practice of submitting and voting on resolutions is a typical part of business in Congress, state legislature, and other public assemblies. These bodies use resolution for two purposes.

First, resolutions express their consensus on matters of public policy; lawmakers routinely deliver criticism or support on a board range of social issues, legal rights, court opinions, and even decisions by the Executive Branch.

Second, they pass resolutions for internal, administrative purposes. Resolutions are not laws; they differ fundamentally in their purpose. However, under certain circumstances resolutions can have the effect of a law.

ALA Unit 383 Helps Pack Boxes for Troops



Divorced Spouse: Eligible or Not?

November is Membership Month

Is an individual eligible through the war service of a divorced spouse?

A divorced person does not occupy the status of spouse and, therefore, has no eligibility.

But the fact that a member of the Auxiliary has become divorced from the person whom they gained eligibility does not force them to surrender Auxiliary membership, even if they remarry. However, if they become delinquent, they may reinstate their membership only by payment of back dues for all years of delinquency or by establishing new eligibility.
