2022 California Primaries

All California active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the June 7, 2022, Primary Election.

The last day to register to vote for the June 7, 2022, Primary Election is May 23, 2022.

Your county elections office will begin mailing ballots by May 9, 2022.

Your primary Election ballot will include candidates for U.S. Senate, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Controller, Treasurer, Attorney General, Insurance Commissioner, Member of State Board of Equalization, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, U.S. Representative in Congress, State Senator, State Assembly Member, as well as other local candidates.

There are two contests for U.S. Senate on this ballot. You can vote for both contests.

One for a 6-year term ending January 3, 2029; and One for the remainder of the current term ending January 3, 2023

Return your vote-by-mail ballot by mail with prepaid postage as long as it's postmarked on or before Election day and received by June 14, 2022, or inperson to a secure ballot drop box, to a voting location or your county elections office by 8:00 p.m. on June 7, 2022.

In-person voting locations will offer voter registration, replacement ballots, accessible voting machines, and language assistance to those who need it.

Vote centers open in all Voter's Choice Act counties on May 28, 2022.

The following is a story that was shared with me. I am sure you will find it as heart-warming as I did.

Calming Mental Health Triggers: A Mother & Daughter Poppy Story

hen the world shut down in 2020, causing all the changes that we endured and all the lives lost, it took a toll on my mental health and depression. I started counseling with my Pastor.

In 2021, the pandemic didn't get any better and it started to cause a strain on my marriage to the point where my husband and I stepped back from our positions at church as Marriage Ministry Coordinators.

Then in the same year, I caught the virus in July (fully vaccinated in April) and now have lingering effects of the COVID-19 Delta variant. Those lingering effects triggered my anxiety to

extreme high levels which I hadn't experienced since I was in junior high school. Along with other factors in my life, my anxiety came to a breaking point in early March 2022.

I was now experiencing frightening feelings even with just ordinary conversations that would cause me to burst into tears.

This included conversations with my Mommie. Mommie celebrated her 81st birthday in November 2021. In 2011 she was diagnosed with dementia and depression.

I'm her 24/7 caregiver. I took custody of her after Daddy died in 2014.

With her dementia and depression, I always need to strike up a conversation to get her talking and socializing with others. Now, with her seeing me often crying, I noticed her always checking in on me and asking if I was okay. I couldn't let her do that, especially with her suffering dementia.



I prayed and asked God to help me because I didn't want to cause Mommie's triggers of depression when she remembers she has dementia. She would worry herself into an unhealthy place, mentally and physically.

At this time, I was emotionally depressed due to another death in our family and it was about a month later when I cried myself to sleep one night.

That is when I remembered at our District meeting speaking with our Poppy Lady and asking her if I could make some poppies to see if Mommie and I would enjoy doing them together. Our Poppy Lady gave us several to keep us busy.

The next morning I found the container with the items to make the poppies. Mommie and I spent the first day making them and completed one hundred of them. It was wonderful because Mommie was asking about the ALA organization.

We finished our last batch while having a yard sale at home. While working on the poppies in our rocking chairs, my husband, a 20-year Navy veteran, came out to take a few pictures.

Needless to say, we finished all the poppies in happy tears. They were the most refreshing memories with Mommie doing poppies and fellowshipping with one another during those five weeks. It was like time stood still and life came back into both of us.

It's amazing how making a poppy flower can be so meaningful and therapeutic, especially to calm triggers due to mental health illnesses.



Look what our Juniors were able to accomplish:

- They performed 1186 hours of service
- They supplied service to 685 veterans and their families
- They made dozens of cookies and cards for hospitalized veterans
- One Unit's juniors made Valentines, Christmas Gifts and Schools supplies for the families at Fort Irwin
- One Junior completed the Gold Patch Program and two completed the Red Patch Program
- Several Juniors started the Patch Program
- Two were awarded patches at Mission Training in Las Vegas
- Juniors also helped members navigate the internet

On the Unit level Glenda has held all major chairmanships. She served five consecutive terms as Unit President. She served four years as District President.



Dona's true passion with the ALA was certainly Girls State. Dona served as


Girls State Director for many years and was Girls State Chair for the 18th District many times. Her presence was always felt: tiny but mighty.

District 6 Inaugural Armed Forces Day Ball Raises Funds for Operation Wounded Veterans

F or decades the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary have been known within their own ranks for their tireless work helping veterans at home and overseas in a myriad of different ways.

Dual Legion/Auxiliary member Lara Chan and American Legion District 6 Commander Brian McGuinnes

decided to bring this work to the forefront by putting on the first annual **Armed Forces Day Ball.**

May 14, 2022 was a special evening of fun and relaxation but with a most important purpose: to raise funds for one of the Legion's signature programs, Operation Comfort Warriors (OCW).

Commander McGuinness honored American Legion Auxiliary District 6 President Suzanne Winters and unit members for their work collecting food and other items for the victims of Northern California's fires in 2021. In the end 60,000 pounds of goods were delivered to all the victims of all the fires.

Douglas Chace, OCW Director of Operations American Legion National Headquarters American Legion, explained the program because, as he put it, "OCW is the best kept secret of the American Legion despite the thousands of

veterans whose lives it has impacted.

OCW grants provide items, events and experiences to wounded, ill and injured veterans that no government program would even consider including outings, video games, arts and crafts, televisions, iPads, sporting equipment, winter kits and much more."


Also honored by Chace for their connection to OCW were members of Team River Runner. According to McGuinnes, "California's 6th district was instrumental in processing a \$10,000 OCW grant for their program which teaches wounded and disabled veterans how to kavak in order to build strength and confidence.
