
Vision Statement

Department Parliamentarian Anita Biggs helps answer your most perplexing questions


When attending meetings you should have a copy of your unit/ district bylaws and standing rules with you, along with the most recent edition of *Roberts Rules of Order*.

Your District and Unit President should provide you with their respective documents.

There may be Standing Rule(s) that members may question. Any member has the right to recommend changes to Standing Rules and Bylaws.

Standing Rules require approval by 2/3 vote of the members in attendance at a meeting or majority vote approval may be obtained with prior notice to the members.

However, changes/additions to the Constitution and Bylaws require approval by 2/3 of the members, with prior notice and readings at two separate meetings.

Meet the person behind the voice: Elizabeth Norton Doidge.



At the age of 12 Liz (now 39) became a member of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 41 in Monterey through her grandfather, who served in the Marines for over 20 years. She has been an active participant in auxiliary life of one kind or another ever since, enjoying every minute.

Liz comes from a long line of family members who have served their country. Her grandfather, father and aunt all served in the Army during Vietnam. Three of her grandparents served during Korea. She has generations of members of her family who served in the military dating back to the Revolutionary War.

Born and raised on the beautiful Monterey Peninsula, Liz grew up playing softball and basketball. Her mom, Gretchen Norton, was an avid dart player who played at American Legion Posts around the community. Eventually Gretchen decided to join the auxiliary and signed up her children when Liz was in middle school.

Liz has two brothers. One is an older halfbrother who was born and raised in Germany. When her father was serving in Germany he married and had his first son. Liz met him for the first time in 2000 when she was a Junior. When her father returned to the states he remarried and had Liz and her second brother. Through Monterey Unit 41 Liz enjoyed volunteering at Halloween and Christmas parties at the Legion post. On weekends she spent much of her time in the post kitchen and wandering the hills of Monterey. Unit 41 closed in 1999 when Liz was 16 and her membership was transferred to Prunedale Unit 593 near Salinas. There Liz began attending regular meetings during high school because there were no official junior programs). She served as District 28 Sergeant-at-Arms from 2000-2001, and Marshall as a Junior Member.

When Liz graduated college in 2006 with a BA in Liberal Studies, she wasn't yet active in the regular Auxiliary. She started participating here and there as she could. She says, "In 2009 my mom passed away and I got really active with the Auxiliary. I'll forever be grateful for the ladies of the Auxiliary who supported me so strongly following the loss of my mom."

Now active as an adult member for 16 years from 2006 to the present, Liz has been busy. She served as Unit President for four terms and District 28 President for two terms. She was also 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Junior Past President. She has chaired Children in Youth, Constitution and Bylaws, Education, Junior Activities, Leadership, Music, Poppy and Past President's Parley for Unit 593. She has also served as Americanism Chair, Community Service Chair, Past President's Parley, Musician, and Junior Activities for District 28.

Liz has been married to her amazing husband and high school sweetheart Robert for 14 years. Robert is a member of the Sons of the American Legion through his father who served in the Coast Guard during Vietnam. They are raising two daughters, Hailey, 9, and Mckayla, 7. Both girls have been members of the Auxiliary since birth and have been learning about the organization ever since. Both have been active in events at Unit 593 and District 28. They also served as Convention Pages for Convention last year and hope to attend the National Junior Training this coming year.

The Doidge family relocated to Alameda in 2019, which put Liz in a position to further help the Department of California. After serving as Membership Clerk in San Francisco for a year and a half, Liz was elected Department Secretary. She has also been the Department Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, Sergeant-at-Arms, Credentials Chairman, and Musician.

Liz credits who she is today and overcoming difficult times to her auxiliary family. She said in an email, "The Auxiliary has been an essential part of my life since 1995. Whether it was helping out at a yard sale at the post, making pancakes every Sunday for



breakfast all summer, hosting kids parties, or chatting after meetings, the friends and family I've gained through my membership and work for the Auxiliary means the world to me. I used the Auxiliary as a way to stay connected to something my mom was super passionate about. I'll forever be grateful for the ladies of the Auxiliary. I know I wouldn't have the great job I have without the Auxiliary, but I also wouldn't be who I am today."

Newport Harbor Members Ship over 1100 Boxes!



S ince 2018 ALA Unit 291 Newport Harbor members Lily Romanow and Janice Flanagan have been serving our active deployed military by coordinating troop shipping events twice a year in the fall and spring. The boxes contain personal hygiene items, snacks, hot sauce, knitted beanies, cards, puzzles and hand written greeting cards from local school children. The majority of items are donated by legion family members and the local community. The rest is personally shopped for by Lily and Janice.

It takes months of planning for each event. The packing of the boxes is a family affair with a host of legion family members aided by local Boy Scout Troop 1931. In all, these two ladies estimate they have shipped over 1110 boxes overseas.

What is the Military Care Package Mailing Kit?

Since Priority Mail® service supplies are the packaging of choice for families preparing care packages for service members overseas, the USPS has created a "**Mili-kit**" based on the items most frequently requested by the military families.

The kit contains:

- Two each of the Priority Mail large flat rate box MIL-FRB (APO/FPO Flat Rate Box - America Supports You) (12" x 12" x 5-1/2")
- Two each of the Priority Mail medium flat rate boxes O-FRB1 (11" x 8-1/2" x 5-1/2") and O-FRB2 (13-5/8" x 11-7/8" x 3-3/8")
- One roll of Priority Mail tape
- Priority Mail address labels Label # 228: six each
- Customs FORM 2976-A: six each
- Customs FORM Envelope 2976-E: six each

Customers requesting the kit should be transferred to the **Supply Center at 1-800-610-8734**; say "supplies" or select option 1 to be transferred to a fulfillment agent during business hours.

Note: These are free supplies, postage must be affixed.



Military and Diplomatic Mail: Special APO/FPO/DPO Supplies, Boxes, and Forms

You can ship care packages to military addresses at domestic prices, even if you're sending mail overseas. USPS[®] provides free military shipping kits, help with customs forms, military address tips, shipping restriction lists by country, and free package pickup when your shipment is ready to go.

A Little Background on the American Legion Legislation Program

August 9, 1921: The American Legion Legislation begins. The Legion's efforts result in the creation of the US Veterans Bureau, forerunner of the Veterans Administration. Today the Legion continues to lobby for adequate funding to cover medical, disability, education and other benefits for veterans.

June 15, 1923: The first "Flag Code" is drafted during a Legion conference in Washington. Congress adopts the code in 1942. Today the Legion is at the forefront of efforts to pass a constitutional amendment to protect the US flag from physical desecration.

December 15, 1943: Past National Commander Harry W. Colmery starts to write the first draft of what will later become the "GI Bill of Rights", considered the Legion's single greatest legislative achievement.

August 10, 2022: President Joe Biden signed the PACT Act into law, cementing into VA healthcare presumption for ailments caused by toxic air exposure. The most effective way to support The American Legion's legislative agenda is communication. Emails, telephone calls, Legislative Alerts, fax messages and personal letters from constituents have a powerful influence on members of Congress.

One final thought: The US Constitution was crafted with the intent of including every citizen in the legislative process. From electing members of Congress to oversight of their work, every citizen has a stake in our government. Good government is the result of engaged citizens.

Mission in Action Grants

The ALA Foundation wants to help members brand their programs so that the ALA is recognizable in the community for all of their good works. Whether it's storage totes to transport items to a local food pantry, a branded vehicle or trailer to deliver meals to homeless veterans, or signage and banners for your department's ALA Girls State program, the Mission in Action grant will help you work the mission while promoting the organization behind it all.

Qualifications

- The applicant must be an American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) entity – unit, district/ county, or department.
- The proposal must address a specific ALA branding need that will help members with mission delivery and be recognizable in the community.
- Grants are awarded up to \$5,000.
- One grant per grantee in a 12 month period will be awarded.
- Funds may not be used to reimburse expenses paid prior to grant approval.
- The ALA entity must provide a 20% match of the granted amount.

Easy Fundraising Ideas:


Fill Your Jewelry Box Fundraiser

Photography Guidelines When Posting Holiday Photos

Selecting Photographs

- Does the photo illustrate the mission?
- Is what's happening in the picture authentic and positive?
- Are the subjects being genuine?
- Can our audience and/or the public relate to the picture quickly and with ease?
- Is the photo free of inappropriate items such as alcoholic beverages or political signs?

What Not to Do

- Don't force interactions, emotions, reactions, settings, or smiles.
- Don't cut people off at the edge of a photo.
- Ensure good lighting. Do not use photos that are too dark.
- Don't include tobacco, alcohol, obscene gestures, or brand names/logos/emblems.
- Don't make relationships between subjects appear ambiguous.

How to Obtain a Veterans Creative Arts Festival Grant



I would like to share the following Veterans Creative Arts Festival grant information with you in the hope that your Unit can take advantage of it.

An American Legion Auxiliary Foundation (ALAF) Veterans Creative Arts Festival (VCAF) grant can enhance the art therapy programs at your local VA Medical Center (VAMC).

Up to \$2,500 is available for:

- * art supplies (including, but not limited to, paint brushes, easels, markers, canvas, calligraphy pens, guitar picks)
- awards/medals/recognition items for the participants
- * transportation for veterans to and from the local VCAF
- * festival venue fees, if any
- * photography/videography
- * promotion of event (i.e., advertising, posters, printed materials)

The grant must be requested by an ALA entity – usually a Unit or Department – which is in good standing with the IRS (has an EIN and has regularly filed 990, 990-N, or 990-EZ forms).

Up to \$2,500 may be requested for each year's program. There is no requirement that the ALA entity provide additional funds for the program, although they certainly can! Funds cannot be used to reimburse expenses paid prior to the grant approval, so plan ahead! Super easy to do:

- 1. Ask your Unit to sponsor the grant application it's only a 3-page form!
- 2. Contact the individual at your local VAMC who is responsible for art therapy or the local VAMC and explain the grant availability.
- 3. What's worked for previous applications: ask your VAMC contact to create a wish list on Amazon, an Art supply store, or other vendor; that list will provide details for your application. Simply enter "as per the attached list," the total requested, and attach a copy of the list!
- 4. Go to alafoundation.org, click on Grants, then on VCAF Grants, then on the application— you may complete it online or download it, print it, and complete it.
- 5. Submit your application either online or (if you've printed it) by mail.

Grant applications will be considered by the ALAF Board of Directors at their next meeting on January 25, 2023. Please submit your application no later than January 6, 2023 (earlier is always welcome).
