
Vision Statement

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PTSD Symptoms in One Soldier's Life



Veteran Terry Ledford sharing his story

If you search the term Post Traumatic Stress Disorder this is what appears: "PTSD Symptoms in Soldiers/Veterans. Intrusive memories or flashbacks. Recurring nightmares. Hypervigilance. Intense distress or irritability. Developing a destructive addiction. Suicidal thoughts. Physical reactions when remembering the trauma including sweating, nausea, or rapid breathing."

I read this and all I saw were words until I met veteran Theron (Terry) Ledford and his wife Borin Ledford. members of District 12 Elijah B. Hayes Post and Auxiliary Unit 168. When I listened to Terry speak at the post meetings and the topic of PTSD would come up, I knew he had more to say.

Department President Gloria has made these types of issues with veterans her special project this year. I wanted District 12 to have a better understanding of what really goes on in the life of a veteran with this disorder - not just for the veteran who has the support of a loving family but also for the homeless veteran on the street. The disorder is the same regardless of the environment.

As Auxiliary leaders and members we should always strive to educate our citizens, mentor youth, and promote patriotism. We decided to invite Terry and Borin to our District 12 meeting as a guest speaker.

This couple shared a very personal part of their lives with us and walked us through some of their journey. We were all moved by their story. We learned that PTSD is not something that can be talked out of a person because it is with them to stay. Terry gave the analogy of a

superhero. The superhero just wants to be normal yet he knows that he will never be normal. Thus what the superhero does is learn to embrace his super power and to always be on guard.

After Terry and his wife Borin spoke to us, we had a question and answer session. Some of our auxiliary members asked about medication, therapy, marriage counseling and how those play a part in a veteran's life along with physical and medical issues.

Two of our members got very emotional and realized that their spouses had these symptoms. They gained a better understanding of what their spouses suffered from and learned how important it was to listen. They did not know that the veteran also needs a safe place and to always have his or her back. Soldiers are trained to be part of a unit and when they return to civilian life they are vulnerable. PTSD is not only in the head - it takes over the whole body.

Regardless of the circumstances, there is hope. First and foremost, that hope comes from faith.

POW/MIA: A Personal Remembrance

It was the year 1993 when I first attended a POW/MIA Recognition Dinner with my parents. My father was a Navy-Marine WWII Veteran and a member of the American Legion Palo Alto Post 375. I didn't know what to expect but I instinctively knew it was a sad moment: watching the guards walk in dressed in their uniforms, carrying a rifle on their shoulders, holding the flags, the crowd silent, hearing the taps from the shoes they were wearing, the guards' voices loud and clear giving the orders to proceed step by step.

At that moment I felt honored to be part of something so powerful and emotionally heartbreaking as the guards placed the caps of each branch of service on the white tablecloth in front of their chair. Then they stepped back, saluting.

When I looked at my father as the tears ran down his cheeks, I looked around the room through my tears and saw others with tears. As the years went by, I tried not to miss any of these events with the American Legion Post family and friends every year in September.





In 2022 I attended a POW/MIA Ceremony and the overnight Fire Watch hosted by the American Legion, Mission City Post 564, and the District AL Riders. Past Commander Sherry Henry made it her legacy before leaving her position to have a white table set up in a clear case display inside the building to represent that POW/MIA will never be forgotten.

In closing, think of the last time you heard the trumpet playing TAPS:

To those who fought on the battlefield, to those who are still missing, and to those who dedicated their time to bring them home to their loved ones, thank you for your service.

District 11 Hosts The Greater Chapter of the Tuskegee Airman

The **Tuskegee Airmen** were a group of military pilots (fighter and bomber) and airmen who fought in World War II. They were the first African-American military aviators in the United States Armed Forces.

The name also applies to the navigators, bombardiers, mechanics, instructors, crew chiefs, nurses, cooks, and other support personnel. The Tuskegee airmen received praise for their excellent combat record earned while protecting American bombers from enemy fighters. The group was awarded three Distinguished Unit Citations.

'Wall That Heals' Replica of Vietnam Memorial in Washington, D.C., Comes to Sacramento County

"If you had not come home to insults and jeers, I would not have come home to hugs and handshakes." These words from the Education Center at the replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial which came to Citrus Heights from March 30 to April 2 this year express perfectly the reason for the creation of the Memorial in Washington, D.C., and the traveling Wall That Heals replica.

More than 8,000 residents of Sacramento County and beyond came to Rusch Park in Citrus Heights to view and experience that magic about a previously never spoken of event in history for healing and closure.

Also known as 'The Magic Wall' this wall of shiny black granite from India consists of 140 numbered panels with 58,281 names including eight women who died in Vietnam from 1968 to 1975.

Volunteers from ALA Unit 383, local Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), Blue Star Moms, Marine Corp and others helped visitors locate their loved one's name on the Wall, gave tours of the education center, helped those in wheel chairs and walkers maneuver

the still wet and soggy park grass, and answered questions about the Wall and related programs. Visitors came to the Wall 24/7. Many veterans who have never spoken of their experiences and their pain came at night. The magic came for loved ones and those assisting them by looking up a name on the wall, helping them find the name, and showing them how to do a pencil

rubbing of the name of their loved one.







Many items were left at the Wall including flowers, toys, photos, and letters to and from their loved one. Some tell a whole story such as that of John Carl Guenther Jr. from Fair Oaks. John graduated from Bella Vista in 1965 and was killed in 1969 after serving two years. His mother placed a collection of memorabilia that told her son's story including a plastic roadrunner as John's favorite cartoon had been Wile E. Coyote and the Roadrunner. Items not claimed will be stored in the Military Museum, California Military Department. Over 400,000 items from the Wall in Washington, D.C., are in storage.

Another poignant story told by Tim Tetz from the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund was of a blind veteran who had come to the Wall hoping to find his friend who had died in his arms after being shot by enemy fire decades ago. He could not remember his name or the year. Tetz took his hand, and after helping him run it over seven panels, the man finally said, "I know he's here; I can feel him." Tetz remarked, "It was as if his hand was possessed, it was electrified." When his name was finally found the veteran said, "This is the closest I've felt to him in over 50 years." That is the power of the Wall.

Another component of the Education Center is to show how things have changed in many ways since the 1960's. The creation of the "In Memory Honor Roll" invites loved ones of those who died from war related illnesses after they came home to nominate them to be included on the honor roll and to be honored.





The Fresno VAMC provides primary care and specialty health services, including cardiology, psychiatry, neurology, oncology, infectious disease treatment, and more.



National PTSD Awareness Day

June 27 is a day dedicated to creating awareness regarding Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

The US Senate officially designated this day in 2010. In 2014 the Senate designated the whole month of June as PTSD Awareness Month. In the US, 6.8% of adults will experience PTSD in their lifetimes with women twice as likely as men to experience it (10.4% to 5%) frequently as a result of sexual trauma.

Veterans are another group highly likely to experience PTSD during their lives, with Vietnam War veterans at 30%, Gulf War veterans at 10%, and Iraq War veterans at 14%.

On this day, organizations that work with employees, consumers, and patients at risk for the condition work to get information about symptoms and treatments for it out to the public in the hopes that when more people know about the affliction more people who suffer from it will get treatment.
